# **FUNDY**trail

Hugging the coast of the awe-inspiring Fundy Escarpment on the Bay of Fundy, the Fundy Trail is a 2,559-hectare linear park and ecosystem. Its auto parkway travels 16 kilometres (10 miles) along the Fundy cliffs and dramatic coast sculpted by the tides. Part of Stonehammer Geopark and UNESCO-designated Fundy Biosphere Reserve, it travels through 251-million-year-old rock and gives way to breathtaking coastal views. Brilliant red, orange and yellows add to the beauty of the trail in the fall.

Plan to spend some time in the gateway community of St. Martins, just 10



kilometres (six miles) from the entrance to the Fundy Trail. This historic village features two picturesque covered bridges, lighthouses, a long stretch of cobbled beach, craft shops, local general store and local restaurants serving delicious seafood and award-winning chowder. Walk the ocean floor at the sea caves during low tide. Stop at the Quaco

Museum to hear stories of the people who built over 500 ships on the beaches of the Bay of Fundy and learn about the men who captained them and the important role of women in the golden age of sail. The quaint and colourful harbour is popular, with photographers and painters as fishing boats rest in the mud at low tide and then, six hours later, bob at the wharf – a natural demonstration of the highest tides in the world.

## **Visit** the Interpretive Centre and nearby Heritage Sawmill on the banks of the Big Salmon River. Learn

about communities dotting the shoreline and the logging and shipbuilding industries that prospered here during the 1800s and early 1900s. Daily programming, an informative video, gift shop and light snacks are available.

### **Learn** about the birthplace of the Atlantic Ocean and check out the geological tour presented by

Stonehammer Geopark, one of only two geoparks in North America and supported by UNESCO. The Fundy Trail has unique rock formations and tells an extraordinary geological story dating back 251 million years.



### Walk, hike or bike the 10 kilometres (six miles) of coastal multi-use trail. Bring your bicycles! Part of the Trans Canada Trail system,

the Fundy Trail also offers some wheel-chair accessible sections. Its footpaths range from easy walks to challenging two-hour hikes and even a 41-kilometre (25-mile) wilderness hike on

the Fundy Footpath. The path to the Flowerpot Rock is a local favourite. Ask about guided hikes.



Be inspired at 23 scenic lookouts offering unparalleled views of the beautiful bay and cliffs plunging up to 157 metres



(515 feet) in some locations. Imagine newly built ships of the 1800s carrying lumber and heading out with the tides en route to distant shores. Whether you


